

clients new to care

17,358

clients re-engaged in care¹

Because 87% of all new HIV transmissions come from people who are not aware they have HIV or who are not receiving any HIV care,2 this represents a significant contribution toward ending the HIV epidemic in the United States.

HAB EHE-funded providers leveraged their EHE funding to



Deliver rapid antiretroviral therapy services.



Support client navigation through community health workers and peer support.



Expand access to services, including housing, transportation, telehealth, mobile medical units, and extended hours/days of operation.



Develop the HIV workforce and enhance partnerships.


Failing to engage people with HIV who are undiagnosed, or out-of-care has profound long-term consequences, including: increased HIV transmissions, higher health care costs, strains to the public health system, and a diminished quality of life.




