The Foundation and Early Years

From two neighborhood health centers created in the mid-1960s, the program grew to hundreds of health centers in the 1970s.



The 1980s

Health centers faced financial challenges but ended the decade on a firmer footing.



The 1990s

BPHC launched new efforts to fight health disparities and help health centers learn from one another.



The 2000s

The size of the program doubled, while BPHC worked to improve oversight and assistance.



The 2010s and Beyond

The program continued to grow, then was called to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

REMINDER: Scope of Project Annual Budgeting Compliance

Ensure you adequately address the components of [Budget Element A](#):

- Budget reflects revenue and expenses for all sites, services, and activities within the scope of project.
- You may not use award funds to pay someone at a rate that exceeds Federal Executive Level II of the Federal Executive Pay Scale (\$221,900 limit effective January 2024).

FY24 Accelerating Cancer Screening	\$9 million for 18 awards	
FY24 Primary Care Associations	\$69.6 million for 52 awards	
FY24 Behavioral Health Service Expansion	\$238.5 million for 403 awards	
FY25 Transitions in Care for Justice-Involved Populations – Quality Improvement Fund	\$51 million for approximately 51 awards	Closed*
FY25 Expanded Hours	\$60 million for approximately 120 awards	
FY25 New Access Points**	\$50 million for approximately 77 awards	
FY25 Health Center Controlled Networks	\$48 million for approximately 49 awards	Open

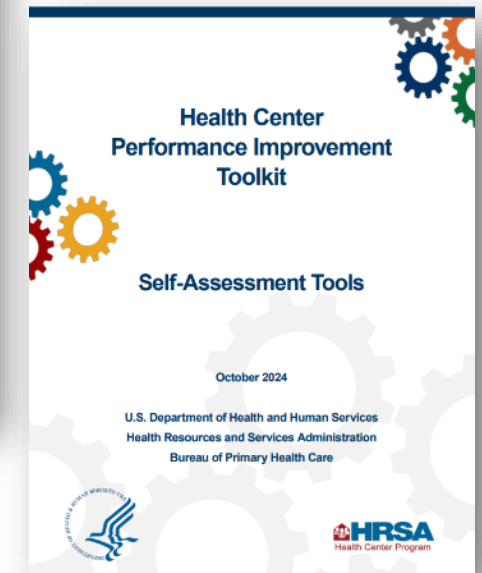
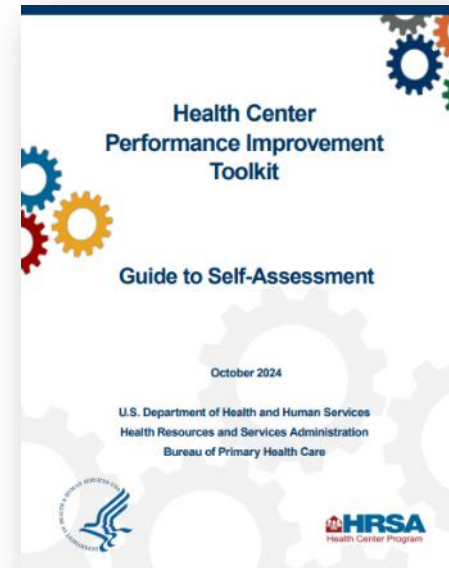
